On January 10<sup>th</sup>, 2024, the last of the Cast-Iron Generation and their spouses passed away, closing a chapter in a book of an amazing generation of people. Betty G. (Kuhn) Armes, born April 16, 1933, widow to George "Fred" Armes, mother to Barbara, Steve (deceased April 2017) and David, grandmother to nine grandchildren and great grandmother to five great grandchildren, peacefully passed away in her home surrounded by family. She had been suffering from a long-term illness the past year. # IN MEMORY OF PETRONELLA COLEMAN 1931-2023 A VALUABLE CVV MEMBER

Petronella Coleman was born on 4/27/31 in Amstelveen, the Netherlands. As a child she lived through the hardships of Nazi occupation, which shaped much of who she was throughout her life.

She met her husband in Utrecht, who lived in the same neighborhood, and they married in 1956. Because of the war, neither had finished school, though she was an excellent seamstress, and he a skilled machinist. Both were bright with dreams of making a better life for themselves and their two young children. In 1962 they emigrated to the US. to seek greater opportunities for their family. They spoke no English and had \$500 in their pockets.

Arriving at a migrant camp in Livermore CA, her husband got a job picking grapes, while Petronella cared for her family, and made valuable friends, who helped them move to a rented apartment in the Piedmont area. Before even buying furniture, they bought a TV! Petronella always credited learning English by watching General Hospital over the years!

She helped her husband get a job in Berkeley as a master tool and die maker, and she was a hard-working seamstress. Over her long life, Petronella was married twice and loved her independence, owning her own home in Clayton and enjoying her friends and neighbours.








# **Book, Movie & TV Reviews**



Uncommon Cargo is based on the true story of the Nguyen family's harrowing race against time to escape South Vietnam and reach freedom. It would not be without heartache, tragedy, and despair, but it is also a story of love, strength of family, and raw determination.



In April 1975, Saigon was a dangerous place. American forces had left Vietnam two years prior, and the northern and southern governments were functioning as two independent countries following the Paris Peace Accords of 1973. But peace wouldn't last. By the early months of 1975, northern communist forces had begun making their way violently southward to depose the American-backed South Vietnamese government and "unify" the country.

Knowing his family could face imprisonment or execution if they stayed, Chau Tan Nguyen, a 40-year old lieutenant colonel and C-130 pilot in the South Vietnamese Air Force, hatched a daring plan to save his family - his wife, Mai, their 3-year-old daughter Truc, 18-month-old son Trung, Mai's parents, Hong and Dat, and Mai's three younger brothers, Son, Dzung, and Tuan.

Much has been written about the American war experience in Vietnam, but precious little chronicles the lives of the Vietnamese families who survived it. *Uncommon Cargo* is the incredible story of one that did.

Eva Nguyen Whitfield, co-author of this book, is CVV Member Jim Whitfield's daughter-in-law. She has autographed this first edition.


Since dishes are prepared individually, we have to give a count one week ahead by Feb. 14 to ensure they have the correct food supplies and staffing.

Dying or reborn? Too soon to tell... Trip to Cincinnati

In October 2023 my husband and I had come to Cincinnati to attend a conference. This was my first visit to the city and it was a bit of a shock. I still am unsure if it is a city dying or a city being reborn. Almost all retail stores except for a few restaurants and coffee shops (most of which closed at 2 pm) had fled or been displaced by construction - mostly due to the conversion of of old, noninternet-wired buildings into condominiums and the tearing down of multi-level parking structures. The seamier part of the city was being gentrified and had already displaced many residents. There was some new city transport that had been planned to take students from the bus transit hub to the university but that plan fell apart due to expense and the new trolley-bus now runs in a circle through the inner city - parts of which are still populated - and up to the sole urban grocery store. The major development plan appears to stress money-making weekend sports events along the river frontage which has been transformed with a number of new arenas and visitors to a small but growing art gallery/theatre section. The three major hotels are set up to cater to the weekend sports attendees and, seemingly, to conference-goers. Decent prices for meals and edible dinners were difficult to find - nothing much between lunch take-out and elaborate menus with elaborate prices and non-memorable food.

The one amazingly different place I discovered was a "boutique" hotel called Hotel Museum that had an art gallery as part of it. And some of the art was moving art. You would see a landscape, trees blowing in the wind and gradually the trees would become streaks and blurs of color, still moving, until there was an abstract painting which would gradually fade back into a different landscape which would then become a new abstract. Or an animal walking or swimming across the screen and gradually the background would start to blur and you would be looking at a different animal before you and that too would gradually morph into another animal. I discovered that there are currently four such hotels to date, each with art exhibits, mostly from local artists. The chain started in St. Louis and was so popular that it is expanding. Plus, it had a dining area attached which I found too late to sample.
