Stay Tuned CVV will be Celebrating Too!



In January 2022, Beacon Hill Village (BHV) will celebrate its 20th anniversary. What started as an innovative concept among a group of friends in the Beacon Hill neighborhood of Boston has turned into a movement. Today there are 19 operating Villages in Massachusetts alone, and over 285 operating and over 40 in development in the U.S. and around the world. BHV has experienced much growth since our founding 20 years ago and today has over 350 members in several neighborhoods across the city of Boston. We believe we change the experience of aging and the lives of our members. In a recent meeting, members expressed the value they receive: 1) life enrichment for less than the cost of a latte per day, 2) psychological benefit of support services across the lifespan, 3) access to and support from other members and professional staff, 4) prepandemic enjoyable experiences; pandemic-a life saver, 5) in addition to social value, the Village enriches the whole person (mind, body, soul). We do this through a robust program calendar of social, cultural and educational events, fitness and exercise programs, assistance with essential services such as groceries and transportation, and information and referrals to professional service providers that enable members to successfully age in their own homes and neighborhoods. We hope you'll join us in celebrating 2022, as the year of the Villages, in honor of our founding and in honor of the hard work that has been done by all Villages in the past 20 years. We are working with Village to Village Network to create a special event celebrating the movement and to bring recognition to everyone. First, we are planning to designate February 15, 2022 as National Villages Day and will host a virtual meeting looking back on how far the movement has come since 2002. Stay tuned for more details. Second, we are working to secure a M.A. and congressional proclamation marking our success as the first Village and for the whole movement, similar to the proclamation we received in 2017 for our 15th anniversary. Please support us in this effort by also asking your local congressman to make a similar proclamation. Here is to more success!

Return of Vacation House Check Program


Beginning on December 6, 2021, the Vacation House Check Program will be offered again to Concord residents, free of charge.

Trained volunteers will perform a thorough inspection of your property at least once per week while you are away, paying close attention to the details provided by you on the online Vacation House Check Request Form. Vacation house checks include a perimeter check, physical and/or visual check of all doors and windows, verification of vehicles left on the property, and verification of any people found on the property.

Vacation House Check requests must be submitted online at least 48 hours prior to departure date and cannot be requested for longer than 60 days.


Movie recomended by Jim and Marilyn


