

The Clayton Historical Museum presents

Clayton Farms

A new exhibit that tells the story of our local farming history (and so much more!)



Before suburbia struck, Clayton was all about farming

Many Clayton homes sit on land that was once used for farming. A special exhibit on the history of Clayton farming runs at the Clayton Museum through June 2022. Visitors can learn about how the early farmers dealt with pests, irrigation, labor and more.

From the mid-1800s through the 1950s, the Clayton Valley was primarily farmed for wheat and later for wine grapes. "Both crops did well in a climate where there is no rainfall in the summer," explained Nancy Niemeyer, creator of the temporary exhibit at the Clayton Museum.

Clayton was home to many wineries, including Mt. Diablo Vineyards and Paul DeMartini Vineyards. Most land eventually transitioned to fruit and nut orchards and row crops.

The exhibit includes photographs, newspaper quotes and artifacts, as well as well-researched history spanning 100 years until housing developments replaced much of the farmland.

Niemeyer, a volunteer who retired from her work as an agricultural biologist with the Contra Costa County Agriculture Department, spent four months putting together the exhibit. Her research took her to the Concord and Clayton Historical Societies and the Contra Costa County Agriculture Department, as well as many online sources.

In the adjacent room of the museum, called the Town Room, there are additional artifacts in the permanent collection that complement this temporary exhibit, including farm tools and old wine bottles.

While there, you can also learn about the first inhabitants of Clayton Valley and early pioneers like Joel and

Village Explorer's Hike on the Iron Horse Trail - Monday, Feb 14th

Barbara Molnar was intrigued by the Iron Horse Trail and shares her thoughts:

On Trains and Carbon Footprints

Strange things happen when you are on the Internet! While looking up info about the Iron Horse Trail, where I'd just completed a CVV Explorers Group hike, I inadvertently ate my husband's portion of the orange-glazed scone I'd saved from our post-hike lunch at Panera. When my husband asked for it, I discovered the plate contained only a few remaining crumbs!

I learned that the Southern Pacific Railroad was the basis of the Iron Horse Trail, hence its name, as they'd owned the track from 1891 to 1978 when it served Concord and Pleasanton, along with numerous other railroads in this area. Transporting people to San Francisco and plying agricultural products throughout the area, it was a sort of pre-Amazon convoy of delivery vehicles, though not quite door-to-door.

Yet on our hike, here we were, still a train, albeit a small one, of mere individuals, (neither encased in tons of steel or carefully engineered impact resistant plastic) simply walking and talking.

Pre-Covid there was a resurgence of this walking trend, when reportedly young adults no longer rushed to buy their own automobile upon obtaining their drivers' licenses. The financial aftermath of 2008 and the expense of owning and maintaining one's personal one-pod 'train' contributed to this – and a bicycle or public transit became a more appealing alternative.

But then came Covid - and that trend dissipated, except for the hard-core cyclists. Back to the personal bubble-pod of an automobile to safely carry the family where they needed to go. BART and buses kept running with only a scattering of occupants. They may never regain their ridership, and may perhaps gradually restrict services, raise rates, or disappear. What then for the marginalized, with no cheap and available transportation to jobs and shopping areas?

Such was the demise of many intercity trams following the onslaught of cheap buses and fuel, which left generations to waste hours in traffic-jammed streets.
