On Sunday, May 1, 2022 Clayton Valley Village will be celebrating its 5th Anniversary. The official launch was held on May 1, 2017 at Endeavor Hall in Clayton. That was an exciting and festive day for CVV with great attendance, support by the business community, local and state officials, proclamation of "Clayton Valley Village Day", and interest expressed by so many in the Clayton-Concord area for this great new concept that had arrived and would be a valuable future asset for all generations.

Leading up to that launch date, there were many individuals in adjacent neighborhoods who had put their time and energy for 3-4 years before then, organizing and stimulating interest in the Village Movement... the concept of helping Seniors stay in their homes as long as possible with the help of free and safe volunteer services. Those key individuals became the core and founding members and volunteers of Clayton Valley Village. This non-profit organization was formed, logo designed, promotional materials created and distributed, and at the same time became a member of the National Village to Village Network as a Developing Village. CVV started to participate in community events, had its 1st fundraiser at La Veranda in October 2014, (Sunday Supper & Silent Auction), gave presentations to civic and social groups, and marched for the first time in the July 4th parade holding its new banner and wearing new T-shirts.

Activities included Social Happy Hours, Lunch N Learn programs, Community Meetings, Bocce teams, and interest circles grew. When Clayton Valley Village received its 501(c)3 non profit status, the Launch Party was on!

CVV has come a long way in the past 8 years thanks to its members and volunteers.... it is a hard working group of people who have enjoyed being together and have supported each other with pride in what they have built. The future indeed looks bright!

The Giants professional baseball franchise was founded in 1883 as the New York Gothams, becoming the New York Giants in 1885. For 74 years the Giants played in New York before then owner, Horace Stoneham, decided to relocate the team to San Francisco in 1957. The move was predicated on declining attendance, the dilapidated condition of the Polo Grounds, but mostly on the Brooklyn Dodgers moving west to the sunny climes of Los Angeles. Thus, it was that on April 15, 1958, the San Francisco Giants made their debut at Seals Stadium, ushering in a new era of Major League baseball to the city by the bay. It was only fitting that the newly ordained, and longtime rival Los Angeles Dodgers, would be their counterpart for that day - and for the ensuing 64 seasons. As it happened, the Giants got off to an auspicious start behind the complete game, six-hit pitching of Ruben Gomez, shutting out the Dodgers 8-0. Shortstop Daryl Spencer connected for the first homer for the Giants, a solo blast in the fourth inning off Dodgers' ace and losing pitcher Don Drysdale, and Orlando Cepeda launched his first in the fifth inning, helping to spark the Giants win. The Orange and Black went on to end the season 80-74 in the National League, finishing third, but ahead of the Dodgers with a 71-83 record. The Giants would spend one more year at Seals Stadium before moving to Candlestick Park in 1960, where they would spend the next 40 seasons before returning to Mission Bay in San Francisco at Pac Bell Park in 2000...Long time San Francisco Giants fans have fond memories of Seals Stadium and of seeing Willie Mays, arguably the most exciting player to ever play the game, roaming center field with an oversized glove, making the basket catch look easy, or racing around the bases (losing his hat) after launching the first of 536 round-trippers he would hit as a San Francisco Giant. Then there was Willie McCovey's 4-4 debut with two triples and two singles on July 30,1959, defeating Phillies ace Robin Roberts 7-2. When Big Mac uncoiled and launched his powerful, low trajectory drives, he struck fear in most major league pitchers. These and other enduring moments are deeply etched in the collective memories of the Giants Faithful. And it all began on that beautiful Tuesday afternoon at Seals Stadium on April 15, 1958.
