IN CASE YOU MISSED IT...

The Clayton Valley Village Program Committee invited a spokesperson from California Phones to speak to our members at the Clayton Library on June 9 about the availability of specialized phones and accessories for qualified* Californians. These FREE devices make it easier to hear, to dial or to see. *Qualified means completing an application for the equipment, having your doctor or hearing aid provider (Costco, for example) complete a portion of the application, and submitting it. California Phones is a program under the Public Utilities Commission of the State of California. It was an excellent 1-hour program. Next: classes on using and understanding your iPhone (Apple product) or Android (various makers). Stay tuned for further details.

There were two Mobile Apps that were recommended by CA Connect, they are AVA & OLELO. The AVA app is empowering deaf & hard-of-hearing people and inclusive organizations with the best live captioning solution for any situation. The OLELO app is an FCC-certified captioned calling cell phone app for deaf and hard-of-hearing users that need captions to use the phone effectively! Your registration information is used only for purposes of preventing fraudulent use of Olelo.



Cuban Sliders

Ingredients

12 small sandwich rolls

1/4 cup mayo

1/4 cup stone ground mustard

1/2 pound deli ham

1/2 pound pulled pork

7 ounces sliced Swiss cheese

1/2 cup sliced dill pickles

Topping

1/4 cup butter, melted

1 Tablespoon stone ground mustard

Instructions

Cut the sandwich rolls in half, keeping them intact if possible. Place them on a rimmed baking sheet lined with aluminum foil.

Spread the rolls with mayo, then top with mustard. Layer on the ham, pulled pork, Swiss cheese, and pickles. Replace the bun tops to complete the sandwiches.

In a small bowl, melt the butter and stir in the extra mustard. Brush the tops of the buns with the butter mixture.

Bake, uncovered, at 350°F for 20 minutes or until cheese is melted and buns are golden brown.



I blame the Kindle which I had somehow won in a raffle at the end of last year. That and the promotional meeting I attended later. First, I had to phone my sister in Southern California to get instructions for how to turn the Kindle on. She had used one ever since they first came on the market and is quite proficient. Then I talked to the librarian at our local library and was advised to get the app Libby if I wanted to download e-books (at no cost to me, through public libraries).

And finally there was the talk about the classes planned for this year through OLLI (Osher Lifelong Learning Institute) at the East Bay (Concord) campus. The speaker was herself a course presenter; her class would be on Agatha Christie, and somewhere in the talk a title of a book caught my ear - "The Thursday Murder Club". It generated a ripple of enthusiasm.

Fast forward and once again an entire weekend has been sucked into the vortex of the Kindle as I read Osman's third book "The Bullet that Missed". I cannot put a hold on the fourth book yet (The Last Devil to Die) but have requested notification when it will be available. I wasn't sure I would become addicted when I downloaded the first book - but the chapters were obligingly short, the characters had personalities that created interest (and laughter) and who in their right mind would use a retirement community for a series about the solving of murders?
