

A DAY OF ART AND CULTURE WITH THE CVV EXPLORER'S GROUP

A DAY OF ART AND CULTURE WITH THE CVV EXPLORER'S GROUP



The Clayton Valley Village Explorer's Group enjoyed an informative arts and culture walk around downtown Concord this week. The hike was ably organized by Dorothy Bradt and Kathy O'Toole, who had not only researched the optimal route to take in the many murals, art pieces and historic buildings, but provided informational hand-outs on what we'd be seeing during the tour.

During the past year, the Creative Concord initiative has produced 8 downtown murals which are worth a closer look, along with the many utility boxes the City has commissioned local artists to paint, which

brighten the Concord landscape.

Our hiking group of 16 met in downtown Concord, at the historic Todos Santos Park, the 2.5 acre park (meaning “all saints”) dedicated in the 1860’s by Concord’s founding father, Don Salvio Pacheco, whose statue (land grants in hand!) greets visitors at the entrance.



The Salvio Pacheco Adobe House (above) was the first permanent structure in the east bay, and has outwardly changed little in the past 100 years. Salvio Pacheco’s home boasted a bull ring, ballroom, and a brick-lined swimming pool and became a cultural and social center as he hosted dignitaries and business meetings here, and re-allocated his 17K acres of local land grants. A friendly gardener allowed us to view the Peace Garden. Our CVV members remember this building as the Adobe Savings & Loan, as well as a restaurant during its time.

The Willow Pass Rd., artwork (right) outside the Brendan Theatre was an impressive mural of a canary guiding other birds, and called "Lead the Way" and painted by an LA artist, Emily Ding.

Across the road, a stop and explanation by our own volunteer and artist, Fiona M. Hughes, of the Mt Diablo landscape she painted (below) on the utility box at the corner of Galindo and Willow Pass.



Willow Pass also boasts an urban Aztec styled painting by Concord artist, Jess Hernandez, called "Mexican Tiahui" (above).

On Concord Blvd., we admired "Procession of Luminescence" by artist, Doran Dada, which is based on Egyptian cultural themes. On Colfax Street a digital art inspired mural, "Forever Growing Centipedes", by John Horton can be seen.



We viewed from afar two early homes on Grant Street: the Bibber House, built in 1912, and the elegant Neustaedter House known for its rich interior and fine staircase, which was built in 1906 by L. Perry for the owner of the early Pioneer Store.

On Concord Avenue we learned about two buildings that had been relocated to their current site: the Old Fire House (left) with its cast iron bell that summoned firemen and signaled curfew, and next door, the yellow landmark Perry House built in 1911 by Lawrence Perry, which has served as a home, a restaurant and currently a law office.

Our interesting art walk culminated back at Todos Santos Park, and a welcome chance to cool off by the fountain in the shady Visitor's Center plaza. A big 'thank you' to Kathy O'Toole and Dorothy Bradt for organizing such an interesting hike for our Explorers, the Concord Historical Society and Mary Rae Lehman for the Concord history, and Sue Elliott for pointing out the murals - as well all who walked!
