

National Village-to-Village Conference Draws Five from Contra Costa

The 8th Annual National Village Gathering brought more than 250 village members from all over the U.S. to Columbus, Ohio, October 17-19. Three Contra Costa villages sent representatives for the opportunity to gain and share valuable information, network with other villages around the country, and learn from each other's experiences.

Clayton Valley Village was represented by Maria Xiaris and Sonja Wilkin. Lamorinda Village sent Ann Ornelas and Jane Tiemann, and Patsy Barich represented Walnut Creek Village. Wilkin was honored as one of the top four Volunteers of the Year during the conference. She was nominated by fellow members of CVV.

The opening keynote was given by Elizabeth Isle of the Global Initiative Entrepreneur Enterprise who spoke on "Senior Entrepreneurship is not an Oxymoron."

The second keynote speaker was Ashton Applewhite, author of *This Chair Rocks: How Ageism Warps our View of Long Life*. Applewhite says she has become "an old person in training."

Manuel Acevedo gave a presentation on his Helpful Village software system. Acevedo, a volunteer from Ashby Village in Berkeley, has developed this system for database management. CVV is in the process of adopting Helpful Village.

The 2017 conference will be November 5-6 in Baltimore.




