You cannot recycle expired smoke detectors locally.



You cannot recycle smoke detectors locally because they contain radioactive components. Volunteer Pete Bardea will be mailing expired smoke detectors to First Alert the second week of October for recycling. If you are a member of Clayton Valley Village, you can put in a service request to have your expired smoke detector picked up by Pete. He will mail them in for you and cover the one dollar charge per device, as well as the cost of postage. If you are a volunteer, you can contact Pete directly to arrange for a pickup or drop-off. If you are personally mailing in your smoke detectors to First Alert, please don't forget to include one dollar per unit to be recycled. Here's the address:

Why Clayton Valley Village is Good for Your Health!

In a recent loneliness study, AARP surveyed adults aged 45 and older and found over 35% of them were lonely. The report also found that loneliness was a key predictor of poor health. In addition, other studies have shown that loneliness can also produce a decline in a person's ability to perform daily living activities and increased the chances for developing Alzheimer's.

Being involved with Clayton Valley Village, either as a member or a volunteer, helps to combat loneliness, even in the face of our current social isolation mandate. Although we can no longer gather in person for our social events, we can gather online through our various Zoom activities such as our monthly "Staying Connected" and "Getting to Know You" gatherings, our "Happy Hour" social events, and our "Lunch 'n Learn" presentations. Our members and volunteers also do daily and weekly check-in calls with our members who request it as well as shopping and delivering groceries for those who are housebound. These volunteer activities benefit both parties (the giver and the receiver) as it provides a meaningful connection for both. By putting our attention on those who need our help the most, we help ourselves to feel more connected and less isolated. All of these activities help to bolster and deepen our "real life relationships" during this challenging time and also help us stay healthy and engaged.

FETTUCCINE BAY SHRIMP SALAD

1 pkg. spinach fettuccine
1 pkg. plain fettuccine
1 jar marinated artichoke hearts, chopped in half
1 green bell pepper, finely chopped
8 oz. tiny Bay Shrimp
seasoned salt to taste
lemon pepper to taste
dried dill weed (1-2 T. to taste)
Extra virgin olive oil
Red wine vinegar

Cook both packages of fettuccine per package instructions. Drain and rinse in cold water. Pour into a large serving bowl. Add the artichoke hearts with marinade. Add green bell pepper and shrimp. Season to taste with salt and pepper and lots of dill. Add oil and vinegar to moisten for tossing. Refrigerate for 1 hour before serving.

If your poached eggs look like this....











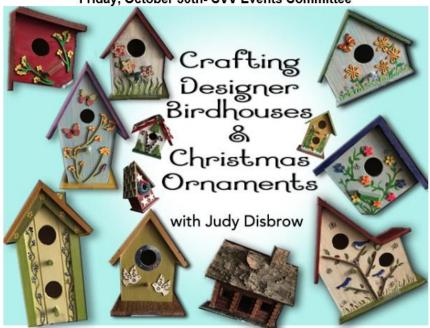
Just sieve the eggs before slipping them into the simmering water (save the excess egg white for another use). This works with refrigerated eggs only.
