Car-Guy to the Rescue: How Mary Ester Found Her (Kia) Soul Mate

From ex-President to gardening help as a volunteer, Jim Whitfield has done a wide variety of different jobs for Clayton Valley Village over his five years with the organization. Whether cleaning out gutters or installing smoke detectors, Jim is always happy to help. However, a recent member-need gave him a challenge to really sink his teeth into, and use his expertise as a self-proclaimed "car guy." Jim responded to a service request from CVV member, Mary Esther Loranger, who asked for automotive advice when she recently needed a new car. Poor Mary Esther was still healing broken bones received during a car accident where she'd been hit and her car totaled. As many might agree, choosing a replacement car can be akin to root canal surgery at the best of times, let alone having to make that decision single-handedly and while recovering from a nasty accident!

Which is why Mary Esther sensibly requested CVV's help in seeking advice on a replacement vehicle. She says, "I didn't know which make or model to even begin looking for. The idea of car-shopping, test-driving and negotiating price just wasn't something I felt comfortable doing alone."

So, Jim Whitfield and Mary Esther pored over the car buyers' issue of Consumer Reports Magazine, and established her criteria. Being 4.11" in height, Mary Esther needed a vehicle she could get in and out of easily – and with a driver's seat that enabled her to easily see through both the front and rear windows. Having weighed the various options, against car ratings, models, size, driver visibility, safety and maintenance ease, they established a pretty good idea of which viable models to go and check out.

"I took Mary Esther down to various car dealerships locally, looking for the right match and model for her needs," says Jim. The first three or four cars had to be ruled out when she found she actually couldn't see out of the back window! However, at the Kia dealership, she discovered something that could work." With its elevated seating height, roomy interior and exemplary safety features, Mary Esther found the award-winning Kia Soul met her check-list. "And best of all, I could finally see the hood as well as the rear window view!" she says.

Jim and Mary Esther took it for a test drive together and she put the Kia through its paces. It performed beautifully, and the Kia Soul got her seal of approval! Next though, would come the daunting part that Mary Esther was dreading... price negotiations. As they talked, however, Jim walked Mary Esther through the options of leasing the vehicle rather than buying it outright. She reasons, "As a senior woman, I just didn't want to deal with tires wearing out and needing replacing, plus all the maintenance issues of owning a vehicle... which quickly becomes obsolete as new features come out".

Jim pointed out the advantages in leasing also include good leasing rates currently, a fixed monthly payment, which is made only for the period you actually use the car, and not for the life of the vehicle. Additionally, with a three or four year lease, you can turn it in and get another car — with new bells and whistles — as your needs or situations change. This sound advice is just what Mary Esther had been looking for when deciding the pros and cons of buying a new car. She opted to sign a three-year lease on a beautiful white Kia Soul, and is extremely happy with her new vehicle (see photo).

Meanwhile, since Jim has been giving car-advice to friends and family for years on which makes and models to consider, he is kindly going to offer a class to CVV members on "Car Replacement 101". 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

Clayton Enhances 9-1-1 Services With Smart911


Clayton, CA April 4, 2018, – Public safety officials announced today that Smart911 is now available to all residents and travelers of Clayton, CA. Smart911 is a free service that allows individuals and families to sign up online to provide key information to 9-1-1 call takers during an emergency. Over 70% of calls made to 9-1-1 come from mobile phones which gives call takers very little information to help you -- only your phone number and a very general sense of your location. With Smart911, you can add key information about members of your household that would help anyone you care for in the event of an emergency, whether the call is from the home or any mobile phone. New Medicare Cards Are On Their Way!

Starting in April 2018, Medicare will begin mailing new cards to everyone who gets Medicare benefits. Why? To help protect your identity, Medicare is removing Social Security numbers from Medicare cards. Instead, the new cards will have a unique Medicare Number. This will happen automatically. You don't need to do anything or pay anyone to get your new card. Do not respond to telephone scam calls! Medicare will mail your card, at no cost, to the address you have on file with the Social Security Administration. 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
