This month we are featuring CVV Founding Member, Gloria Utley.

I was born in Honolulu, Hawaii at the Kapiolani Maternity Home. I moved to the Mainland a while after Pearl Harbor was bombed when the U S Military evacuated a lot of the women and children from the islands. Passenger ships were taken over for military use on this project. I spent my school years in San Francisco and attended Guadalupe Elementary School that was a few blocks from my house. I lived in the Crocker Amazon district. If we climbed the hill across the street from our home, we could look down on the Cow Palace. A favorite pastime, weather permitting, was to open up cardboard boxes and ride them from the top of the hill to the bottom. Lots of fun. There were days when we came home from school to find cowboys rounding up cows that had wandered too far from their pasture lands to our front lawns.

I attended James Denman Jr. High School for the 7th through 9th grades. This was about 1-½ miles from home and we walked it every day unless it was raining. Balboa High School is next door to Denman so the distance was the same. That is where I became interested in football. I attended every game I could. When Bal won their first city championship, I was there. The trip back to the school football field and the post-game celebration was great. Very good memories.

I attended City College in San Francisco and graduated with a degree in Dental Assisting with a minor in business. One of my graduation presents was a trip to Hawaii for the whole summer. I stayed with family in the beginning and then moved to a duplex on Waikiki Beach for the rest of the time. As some of my friends in San Francisco were surfers, it was natural to hang around with them on Waikiki as well.

While I was managing Adobe Savings & Loan, I returned to college for a BA in Business Management. I attended Saint Mary's College in Moraga. I entered the extended education program in 1984. However, since I could not carry over some of the units I had earned from my junior college major, it took more than the usual amount of time to complete my degree. I finished my upper division classes on schedule while working a 40-60 week. I then had to attend Diablo Valley and Los Medanos Colleges to complete my lower division classes. I was the first one in my family to earn a college degree.

GETTING TO KNOW CLAYTON

Johny Khalilieh of La Veranda and Oakhurst Country Club by Fiona Hughes



Growing up in Bethlehem, Palestine, the son of an auto mechanic, Johny Khalilieh couldn't have imagined that he'd end up in Northern California, owning a family restaurant, plus running food and beverage for one of the area's finest country clubs. At age 18, Johny arrived in the USA to begin college as Los Medanos, Pittsburg, where he earned a masters degree in mathematics, with a goal of becoming a math teacher. He was young, ambitious, and had plenty of drive – and just as well... at one point he was forced to live in his car when the family he was

staying with lost their home. Undeterred, Johny kept working hard, taking odd jobs and became manager at Red Lobster, where his math abilities plus his newly learned food management skills equaled business success. He was made General Manager.

In 1995 he met and married Joane, also a math wiz, and they teamed up to teach mathematics at DVC, LMC and San Francisco State. Johny, together with Joane's family, then bought La Veranda Cafe, the Italian bistro in the heart of Clayton. Naturally, as co-owner, Johnny got involved managing the restaurant with family members, Anis and Nick, where he planned the Italian dishes, selected the chefs, and readied the restaurant for business. The Café's opening night on May 4, 2002 happened to coincide with another very important event... the birth of their son, Jake! "Thankfully," said Johny, "Joane didn't actually give birth until I arrived at the hospital – complete with a big bowl of steaming pasta for her! We have enjoyed raising our family here in Clayton." He and his wife are justifiably proud of their children, Reyna and Jake, both 4.4 GPA students. "I was drawn to Clayton's small-town feel and it's great to really get to know our customers personally and provide what they enjoy".

Johny's 'can-do' attitude and the success of La Veranda has drawn many dining fans in Clayton and surrounds. This includes our Clayton Valley Village members, who have appreciated La Veranda's support for the past five years for many of our events. It's where we choose to host mixers as well as our October Sunday Supper & Silent Auction – a big highlight of the year. In 2008 Johny and his growing family opened a Pittsburg location of La Veranda Italian restaurant, which is where you can often find him, seeing to all the food and beverage needs.

Earlier this year, Oakhurst Country Club's GM, Michael Clark tapped Johny to manage the Club's food and beverage.

Johny realized the opportunity to improve the Club that he enjoyed as a member, and enthusiastically agreed to grow its services for the Clayton community. So far, he has hired a new chef (from Crow Canyon Country Club), and has improved the food service, as evidenced by positive comments from the Country Club's members. As Johny reasoned, "Many of us enjoy or live alongside the golf-course, and it's important to me to keep it profitable and of high-value for members.



After all, if the golf-course goes down-hill, all our property values go with it". Further Oakhurst Country Club events are planned by Johny and the Events team, such as their already successful new Dueling Pianos Night, plus jazz evenings, wine dinners and the ever-popular family favorite pasta nights. There is a social & tennis membership at Oakhurst (\$105 per month, plus a \$250 initial membership fee) giving more opportunities to enjoy the Club even if you're not a golfer.

Here is a sample list of things that volunteers could help you accomplish:


Light yard work Install smoke detectors Help organizing an office or garage Help rearranging furniture Hang pictures or mirrors Fix or replace a hinge or door knob Flip bed mattresses Take down or put up a curtain rod Replace light bulbs (12 ft. max Ht.) Lubricate doors Replace heater/refrigerator filters Install shower head Paint mail box Replace a door screen Replace toilet seat Replace toilet tank flapper Adjust toilet tank water level Replace/repair doorbells Change alarm, remote batteries Make a thermostat work Set up TV, cable, garage remotes Reset an irrigation timer Tighten garden hoses Reset breaker box or GFI...once Help with computer issues Repair a drip in an irrigation line Lift heavy boxes Move patio furniture Pot plants (in pots, not in ground)

Install solar yard lights

Help setting up and taking down Christmas decorations

Bring things down from attic using pull-down ladder (with second volunteer)
